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Script Encoding Initiative

The Consortium is particularly grateful to the work of the Script Encoding Initiative (SEI), under the direction of Dr. Deborah Anderson. The SEI project, located in the Department of Linguistics at the University of California at Berkeley, has undertaken the important work of preparing proposals for encoding for less-commonly used scripts and those of scholarly or historic interest. In the Version 6.0 time frame, the SEI organization has engaged with the user communities, prepared proposals, provided fonts, and shepherded many proposals successfully through both the Unicode Technical Committee and the JTC1/SC2/WG2 ISO/IEC 10646 standardization processes. The new scripts and characters proposed by SEI and encoded after Version 5.0 of the Unicode Standard include:

- Carian, Cham, Cyrillic additions for historic characters, Kayah Li, Latin additions for Medievalists, Lepcha, Lycian, Lydian, Myanmar additions for minority languages, Ol Chiki, Rejang, Saurashtra, Sundanese, and Vai scripts and characters in Version 5.1.
- Avestan, Bamum, Common Indic Number Forms, Devanagari Extended, Egyptian Hieroglyphs, Imperial Aramaic, Inscriptional Pahlavi, Inscriptional Parthian, Javanese, Kaithi, Meetei Mayek, Old South Arabian, Old Turkic, Rumi Numeral Symbols, Samaritan, Tai Tham (Lanna), Tai Viet, Unified Canadian Aboriginal Syllabic additions, and Vedic Extension scripts and characters in Version 5.2.
- Mandaic, Batak, Brahmi, Bamum additions for historic characters, and Arabic additions for Kashmiri in Version 6.0.
